#### Changes to how we manage Behaviour – from 15.05.23

"Good behaviour is good for everyone" and from Monday, we are making 2 important changes to the way we currently manage truancy from lessons and persistent, low-level disruption in the classroom.

This choice behaviour is having an impact on the learning and well-being of students involved, as well as impacting the quality of learning in the classroom. It is also having an impact on the resources we have available, too much time is being spent 'negotiating' with students that persistently refuse all instructions and offers of support.

Staff time needs to be focussed in supporting students that want to be in school and want to learn.

The changes we are making will only impact students that choose not to follow our expectations.

#### **Resolving Truancy from Lessons**

We've added movement time to the school day – there is no excuse for being late to lessons. If students are not in their classroom or lined up outside their classroom by the lesson bell, they will be deemed to be truanting. Anyone found truanting will be taken to ISR for that lesson. An after-school detention will be set for either Friday or Monday and an Edulink message will be sent to parents.

If a student truants again that same day, they will be placed in ISR and remain there for the rest of the day. Staff now have corridor passes that students can be given if they need to leave the lesson at any time – this can be managed at staff discretion. In this way, we will be able to identify students not in lessons with a legitimate reason, and students that are truanting.

It is therefore important that students (and a large majority already do this every day) ensure they arrive to each lesson BEFORE the lesson bell rings.

#### **Resolving Disruptive Behaviour in the Classroom**

There are no changes as to how students will be warned in lessons. We will continue to write their name on the board as a first warning and tick the name as a final warning. If a student is removed from a lesson, they will be taken to ISR for the remainder of the lesson. Parking and the Blue Card Report are scrapped. An after-school detention will be set for either Friday or Monday and an Edulink message will be sent to parents. If a student is removed from another lesson that same day, they will be placed in ISR and remain there for the rest of the day.

### **Resolving Persistent Defiance – Refusal to Follow Instructions**

We are taking a zero-tolerance approach to persistent defiance. In both cases above, should a student refuse to go to ISR on first request, they will be placed in ISR for the rest of the day. If they continue to refuse, a final warning will be given, and they risk suspension.

Suspension is always a last resort, but if a student has no intention of following any instructions, it becomes a necessary outcome to safeguard everyone concerned.

Students will be fully briefed of these changes by their tutor from Monday, and support will ALWAYS be available for anyone that needs it, no matter what the reason.

If, however, someone persistently refuses to follow the rules, then Wadham is not the school for them.
