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The Good

Wadham's Mental Health Champions

I'm delighted to announce that we have appointed our very own student Mental Health Champions. The Bad

Cycling to School: Road Safety

It's great to see students cycling to school – both for the environment and for their own personal health and fitness.

At the same time though, can I echo concerns raised by other road users and pedestrians that are commenting on the number of young people riding to school without proper safety equipment – namely a cycle helmet and working lights.

We would expect ALL cyclists to ensure they are wearing appropriate safety equipment when riding to/from school, that their bikes are roadworthy and that they have lights to be used when it is dark.

I have asked staff to challenge cyclists and insist helmets are worn and lights are used. Please can I ask that parents and carers do the same.

Picking Up / Dropping Off at School

This is never an easy issue to resolve, but please can I ask all road users to be mindful of their surroundings when waiting to drop off/collect children from school. In particular, please ensure that you only park in permitted areas, not blocking residents' drives or junction entrances.

I am keen to explore any and every solution with the council, but in the meantime am extremely grateful for a common sense and 'neighbourly' approach from our road users in showing consideration towards local residents.

Staff Absence

Unexpected circumstances beyond our control mean that we are currently faced with long-term staff absence in 2 subject areas – English and Geography. We already have adverts out to recruit a new SENDCo and a new English Teacher, with actions also in place to resolve Geography. In the meantime, we have secured agency staff to cover these absences and both Miss Davidson and Mr Tustin, as Curriculum Leads, are ensuring that work set is appropriate. I know that this is not an ideal situation, but please be assured that we will continue to do all that we can to minimise the impact this has on our students.

The Ugly

Finally, although this last item is limited to a very small group of students in Years 10 and 11, for transparency (and for your support) I'm sharing to all my concerns regarding incidents of offensive language and extreme defiance shown recently towards others.

We are an inclusive school. We see the best in everyone and promoting a culture of 'unconditional positive regard' we're working hard to ensure that no one is lost, forgotten or left behind.

Support is here for anyone that needs it, regardless of the reason why it is needed.

Sometimes a young person may need time to accept that we (parents and staff) really DO have their best interests at heart, and so long as they are willing to TRY and engage with support offered, we know positive change CAN be achieved.

It is not our purpose, however, to explain to a student that is refusing to attend lessons WHY they should do so. Similarly, in line with other public offices and places of work, we will not accept the use of offensive language or threatening behaviour towards others - in any form.

In protecting the learning and well-being of everyone at Wadham School, the following is made clear:

- Students that choose to behave in this way risk suspension.
- Students that choose to *persistently* behave in this way risk permanent exclusion.
