You may have seen in the news that a small number of schools have been affected by a new TikTok trend circulating currently. The trend involves students choosing to perform an act of protest at their school – using TikTok and other social media platforms to organise and incite others into action.

A great deal of content is on social media currently – speaking with my own children, my 2 eldest have had images and videos appear on their feeds and there is a lot of talk about these protests among their peer groups at school – it's clearly a viral topic amongst young people currently!

The same is true at Wadham. We know students have been talking about this trend, but more importantly, we have been contacted by some parents to make us aware that messages have been shared on social media suggesting that students at Wadham form their own protest.

In no way do I wish to silence student voice, but it is important that students know how they should make their views heard - without disrupting learning and education.

Students can speak to their tutor directly if they have any concerns or views regarding school provision they wish to share. Equally, there are student voice representatives in every tutor group that take forward the views and opinions of the student body to Council meetings. Our next Student Council meeting is on Friday 10^{th} March.

In the meantime, despite what may happen in other schools, I am hopeful that Wadham students will choose to follow our existing process to ensure their voice is heard.

In any case, senior staff will be on the main gate tomorrow and over the next few days to monitor the situation and support anyone that needs it. This is the perfect opportunity for any student that feels strongly about school provision to come to us directly and tell us!
